Introduction to our Annual Report - From the Te Pou Team

E te whānau whānui o Te Pou, tēnā koutou katoa. Mauri tū, mauri ora. You are the heartbeat of Te Pou Theatre and two years from opening, our purpose-built whare still hums with the stories, laughter, waiata and wānanga gathered over a decade of mahi. In 2024, that heartbeat grew stronger, louder, and, because of you, steadier than ever.

KAUPAPA HIGHLIGHTS

In 2024, the **10th Kōanga Festival** solidified the festival as central to the Tāmaki calendar over three weeks, 12 kaupapa, **3 500+ audience members** and **200+ artists**. *Tōiri* (with NZ Opera) filled the space with soprano-soared reo Māori, Whānau Day reached new heights and script-reading sessions sold out and shook with laughter.

Beyond Kōanga the rohe kept pulsing. Four mainstage productions, *Hyperspace*, *Tangi a Te Tūi*, *The Handlers* and *Kōpū (remount for Kirihimete)*, forged fresh partnerships from *Auckland Theatre Company* to *The Dust Palace*. Our annual **Matariki Ahunga Nui Kaitahi** brought over 50 Māori performing-arts practitioners together for wānanga and kai, reflecting on the stories, memories and tears of the year that was, and sending our hopes to Hiwa-i-te-Rangi for the seasons ahead.



Taking direction and learnings from our Matariki gathering, our capability programme **Whakapuāwai** delivered **10+ free wānanga** for **100+ practitioners**, while **Te Arero Toi** nurtured the next wave of reo-Māori playwrights. For the sixth time we hit the road with **46 shows** of *Te Hokinga Mai A Hoiho* reaching **6 000+ tamariki** from Tāmaki Makaurau to Te Tai Tokerau, proving our mahi travels as gracefully as it stands still.

OUR PEOPLE – HE RŌPŪ ITI, HE RŌPŪ KAHA

June brought a heartfelt poroporoaki for **Amanda Rees**, long-serving *Poutoko Hinengaro* whose fundraising mahi helped raise these very walls. Her fingerprints remain on every beam. New and familiar faces eased the transition, with **Chloe Weavers** who had returned from steering Silo Theatre in 2023 and **Rei Samuels** arriving with decades of Whakaata Māori wisdom. We also welcomed **Ellen-Moana Smith** to the newly created Front-of-House Manager role, while **Keira Howat** also joined as our first permanent Senior Venue Technician. **He Kai Kei Aku Ringa** interns **Eden Webster** (Marketing & Comms) and **Kaea Umuhuri** (Venue Tech) both completed their internships and now serve in full-time roles. Our producer and longest serving staff member **Maioha Allen** was chosen to attend *Talking Stick - North America's Premier Indigenous Arts and Culture Festival* helping to continue and solidify our bonds with Indigenous artists all around the world, while Eden was given the opportunity to pitch a work at APAX (Aus) during her internship. E mihi ana ki a koutou, to our new and existing kaimahi who are essential in keeping the whare warm and the kaupapa thriving.

Introduction to our Annual Report - From the Te Pou Team

FY 2024 closed with **\$1.7m revenue, \$1.6m costs**, and a **\$120k surplus**. True to our kaupapa, that pūtea isn't spare change, it's a seed. **\$50k** now strengthens our reserves, and the balance rolls into FY 2025 to soften against the sector's tightening winds. FY 2023's larger figures reflected one-off capital pūtea for the build, with construction complete, revenue and costs have returned to sustainable operating levels while activity has and continues to grow.

Our income remains intentionally broad, with just under **70% from Funders, Trusts, and personal donations, and 30% from venue hire, tickets and bar revenue**. With the final tranche of **Manatū Taonga** COVID-resurgence funding fuelling our 2024 growth, our 2025 budgets are deliberately conservative, banking embers from this year's fire to keep us warm in leaner seasons. We're tending that flame through deeper partnerships with **Toi Aotearoa | Creative New Zealand, Auckland Council** and **Tātaki Auckland Unlimited**, while broadening philanthropy and commercial ventures to spark our next chapter. In short, we've kindled a strong, steady fire in our community and are carefully stoking it for the cold times ahead.



In the coming year, we are leaning into the mahi of tending our ahi kā, fueling a steady flame and a welcoming whare for our Māori performing-arts community. Our focus is expanding our capability-building programmes, a larger internship intake, artist residencies, exploration of vocational accreditation, establishment of a Rangatahi Council, and the final strides of our **Niho Taniwha** strategic plan while shaping the next five-year vision.

To every ringatoi, trustee, funder, donor, volunteer and audience member who brewed backstage tea, wiped glitter from the floor, enjoyed a hangi bun or simply filled a seat, **ngā mihi maioha ki a koutou**. Your aroha is the heartbeat we continue to hear when the last person has left the whare.

We face the future together, hopeful, proud, and ready. **Me hoki whakamuri, kia anga whakamua** walking backwards into the future, carrying the wisdom of those before us.

Whakaari | Te Pou Presented Shows

Our **Whakaari** programme is **Te Pou Theatre's** Artistic Programme, driven by our values of *Creative Ingenuity & Tohungatanga*, where new and loved Māori-led works come to life with first-class production values. In this, our second year in the whare we brought four major shows to the stage. First up was ***Hyperspace*** (Albert Belz), which presented at the ASB Waterfront Theatre in partnership with *Auckland Theatre Company*. Back in our home space we then shared ***Te Tangi a Te Tūi*** (Amber Curreen and Tainui Tukiwaho) alongside *The Dust Palace* in February and March, followed by Poata Alvie McKree's powerful ***The Handlers*** in May and June. Over July and August, our free reo-Māori children's show ***Te Hokinga Mai a Hoiho*** (Tainui Tukiwaho) toured to **46 kura kaupapa** and **6,000 tamariki**, and in November we marked Kirihimete with a return season of ***Kōpū*** (Tuakoi Ohia) following national tours of this work to *Māorilands, Tairāwhiti Festival, Toi ora ki Kirikiriroa, Turner Centre Kerikeri & Forum North Whangārei*.

The story doesn't end on the stage. ***Hemo Is Home*** (Tainui Tukiwaho), the first production to premiere in our new whare in 2023, was selected by *Māorilands* to further develop the script **into a feature film**. Tainui will also soon be pitching the work at Imaginative 2025.



The Handlers

Nā Poata Alvie McKree

After its early development in the **Kōanga Festival Playwright Programme** 2022 and creative incubation with *Auckland Theatre Company* in 2023, ***The Handlers*** by *Poata Alvie McKree* had its powerful premiere at Te Pou Theatre in 2024. With 17 performances including two school matinees, this season marked one of our most ambitious yet.

Alvie's debut stage production was guided by Director and Dramaturg *Amber Curreen*, and championed tuakana-teina values, pairing experienced designers like *Jane Hakaraia* with emerging artists. The kaupapa was also supported by our **He Kai Kei Aku Ringa** internship programme, enabling two mid-career producers to step up and be mentored through the process.

Community engagement was central, with Tātaki Auckland Unlimited helping to ensure Crown Lynn whānau, ex-factory workers, and West Auckland locals were part of the audience.

Nearly every show sold out, with full houses and waitlists in the final week. Audience surveys reflected the emotional resonance: 71% rated the show “outstanding” and 27% “great.” For many, this was the first time seeing their own stories on stage, a nostalgic celebration of place, people, and pride, while also confronting racism and injustice. With 40% of audiences new to the whare, **The Handlers** proved the power of local storytelling to connect across generations.

Te Tangi a te Tūi

Co-written by *Amber Curreen* and *Tainui Tukiwaho*, developed and presented in partnership with The Dust Palace, **Te Tangi a te Tūi** premiered in our whare to as part of the *Auckland Arts Festival 2024*. The show wove the call of the tūi into an allegory of language loss and revitalisation. It was bold, breathtaking, and utterly unlike anything audiences have seen on stage before.

From the start, this was about shared growth. Supported by the *Manatū Taonga Innovation Fund*, the project was a true exchange, rangatahi Māori trained in circus, circus artists developed their reo, and teina placements in costume and stage management were mentored by seasoned tuakana. This wasn't just a show, it was an illustration of learning and collaboration and working together in a kauapapa māori framework.

With sold-out performances and packed school matinees, the show was a huge success. An impressive 88% of surveyed audiences called it “outstanding,” as **Te Tangi a te Tūi** struck a deep chord.

Whether fluent speakers or new learners, audiences found themselves moved, challenged, and inspired.

We are delighted that the kuapapa continues, with the show heading into regional centres in 2025 and beyond that, we see a horizon filled with possibility.

Kōanga Festival 2024

Whakaari | Te Pou Presented Shows



In 2024, we celebrated **ten years of Kōanga Festival**, a proud milestone for this kaupapa-led platform nurturing and showcasing Māori voices on stage. From September 6–28, our whare came alive with theatre, wānanga, and community events that honoured the depth and breadth of Māori creativity.

The festival featured **13 kaupapa** across the month, including **three new works**, **two playreadings**, the annual Playwrights Programme, **four wānanga**, our first time welcoming international artists and multiple community activations. Over **3,500 people** engaged with the festival, with **more than 200 creatives**, crew, volunteers, and kaimahi contributing to its delivery.

Kōanga remains the beating heart of our year, a space for innovation, gathering, and intergenerational exchange, grounded in te ao Māori and powered by whanaungatanga.

Whānau Day

Our biggest Whānau Day yet brought nearly **1000 people** through Te Pou for a free celebration of storytelling in all its forms. The whare and surrounding green space came alive with kai stalls, weaving and circus workshops, live music from *MOHI*, and a return season of *Te Hokinga Mai a Hoiho* following its Northland tour. With over **110 performers** and **25 local businesses** involved, the day was a vibrant showcase of creative talent and community spirit.



The Playwrights Programme

The beating heart of Kōanga, our annual playwrights' workshop saw four new Māori works developed a month, and brought to life in a week of intensive wānanga. Guided by mentor *Victor Rodger*, *Tūi Matelau*, *Tawhi Thomas*, *Rainton Oneroa* and *Turene Jones* shared their scripts with an audience for the first time.



International Indigenous Exchange

For the first time, we hosted our whanaunga from *Te Whenua Moemoeā* through a partnership with *Moogahlin Performing Arts*, *Yirramboi*, and *Ilbijerri Theatre Company*. Together, we shared kai, tikanga, and creative practice, culminating in a powerful playreading of *The Visitors* by *Jane Harrison*, performed by an all-Māori cast.

Regional Engagement & Access

In collaboration with *Nōna Te Ao Trust*, we supported rural Māori employment and education pathways. Rangatahi were brought to a performance of *Be Like Billy* as part of a wider activation to expand access to Māori arts.



Te Hokinga Mai a Hoiho | Schools Tour

Whakaari | Te Pou Presented Shows

Our 2024 tamariki tour, **Te Hokinga Mai a Hoiho**, brought the magic of reo Māori storytelling to over **6,000 tamariki** across Tāmaki Makaurau and Te Tai Tokerau. A sequel to 2023's **Te Haerenga a Hoiho**, this new chapter deepened our commitment to creating accessible, uplifting theatre for tamariki, kura, and communities across Aotearoa.

Visiting **46 kura**, the tour offered a rich theatre experience tailored to its audiences, from **full-immersion shows** for Kura Kaupapa Māori to bilingual versions for mainstream schools.

Te Hokinga Mai a Hoiho | Schools Tour

Whakaari | Te Pou Presented Shows

By embracing a **tuakana-teina** approach among the cast and crew, performers at different stages of their reo and performance journeys provided a real-life example of learning in action.

At the heart of this kaupapa is making things **accessible**. Shows are run on a **koha basis**, aiming to support rural and lower decile schools, recognising the hurdles many encounter in getting to see live theatre.

Whakapuāwai | Capability Building

Whakapuāwai is built on the belief that our sector thrives when Māori artists have access to dedicated, kaupapa Māori development. In 2024, we delivered **14 free wānanga** shaped by kōrero at our annual Matariki hui, ensuring each opportunity was responsive to the aspirations of our creative whānau.

Over **100 Māori practitioners** engaged with workshops in acting, voice, producing, directing, and more. Each session was grounded in te reo, tikanga, and whakawhanaungatanga, from rangatahi stepping onto the stage for the first time to established artists sharpening their tools.

We were proud to partner with *Equity NZ*, and others to offer 14 **expert-led sessions**, and we're especially proud of the ripple effects: participants leaving more confident in their craft, their reo, and their creative identities.

Thanks to the specific and targeted support from *Creative Henderson-Massey*, *The Trusts Community Foundation* and *Te Mātāwai*, this kaupapa remains free, open, and future-focused.

INTRODUCTION TO PLAYWRITING

A one day playwriting intensive specifically for kaituhi who have an idea and are looking to start developing the first draft. This workshop provided the initial tools and structure for a first draft, as well as tips to combat writers block.



KOI SHARPEN UP WĀNANGA

Delivered in partnership with *Equity NZ*, this one day acting workshop was delivered by **Miriama McDowell** and friends for Māori and Moana Nui performers to focus on sharpening skills and deepening connections.



TE POU AWE: RANGATAHI ACTING

An eight-week acting intensive in te reo Māori for rangatahi. Led by **Tainui Tukiwaho** they explored audition prep, character development, and te ao Māori creative processes.



TE ARERO TOI WĀNANGA

Delivered in partnership with *Playmarket* this was a playwriting wānanga hosted by **Hohepa Waitoa**, and **Tainui Tukiwaho**, about different approaches to playwriting in te reo Māori and tools to help with writing.



GETTING AUDITION READY: SELF TAPE INTENSIVE

A one-day workshop with **Tainui Tukiwaho** focused on auditioning for stage and screen, with a special emphasis on building confidence and technique in self-taping.



PLAYWRITING INTENSIVE

A one day playwriting intensive designed to support kaituhi looking to workshop, refine and develop an existing draft, getting it ready for the stage under the guidance of **Tainui Tukiwaho**.

Capability Building Internship

Thanks to the backing of the **Manatū Taonga Cultural Sector Regeneration Fund**, Te Pou Theatre launched a groundbreaking internship program aimed at nurturing emerging Māori producers and venue technicians. Based on a haukāinga model, the Venue Technician Programme spanned six months, while the Producers Programme extended over twelve months. This initiative fostered authentic, kaupapa Māori learning environments for four skilled Kaihāpai.

Venue access and support for the performing arts community

A core aim of Te Pou Theatre is to reinvest directly into the growth of our kaupapa, ensuring artists, programmes and communities feel the benefit. Through our Haukāinga Model, **we subsidise approximately 75%** of standard venue and production costs for removing barriers and making the stage more accessible for Māori creatives. We also support wider community use of the whare, offering further subsidies or koha-only access where possible, including kaupapa like the *Under the Same Moon* fundraiser and *Te Rōpū Manutaki* kapa haka rehearsals.

Venue **occupancy increased significantly in 2024**, with a steady stream of diverse groups and organisations using the space. As well as supporting the development of new Māori work, we welcomed artists rehearsing for national tours (**Dakota and the White Flats**, *Red Leap Theatre*), community festivals (**HOLI Festival**), development wānanga (*Rodney Bell*, *The Rebel Alliance*), international exchange (*Kōanga International Indigenous Exchange*), and public performances including **I LOVE YOU G** (*Massive Theatre Company*), **Li'i Tapu**, **Tales of an Urban Indian**, and **NZ International Comedy Festival** events. This year, as always, our whare was not just a venue, but a gathering place for creativity, connection, and community.



Description of Entity's Outcomes

Our kaupapa (purpose) is to provide mana uplifting experiences and storytelling through kaupapa Māori led, collective approaches to performing arts.

Our Whaingā (goals) are:

- To create and sustain a kaupapa Māori led performing arts venue
- To create and sustain a programme of storytelling
- To build capability among young people
- To support and encourage the growth and development of the Auckland Māori performing arts sector
- To support and encourage an inclusive performing arts sector
- To increase Māori community engagement with the performing arts
- To connect all communities of Aotearoa to Māori performing arts
- To increase diverse community engagement with the performing arts

Description and Quantification of the Entity's Activities

During the reporting period Te Pou Theatre opened a new kaupapa Māori led performing arts venue which was used by a total number of 1,656 performing arts practitioners to develop and stage work seen by a total number of 14,862 audience members.

We ran free capability building workshops for a total number of 197 Māori performing arts practitioners to ensure the ongoing strength of the the performing arts sector. This included a year long internship programme introduced mid 2023.

We partnered with The Dust Palace to develop pedagogy and run free classes to teach tamariki Māori circus skills drawing on matauranga Māori.

We staged two main bill productions at our venue, and toured a third production for free to kura in Northland and Auckland. We reached a total of 9,764 audiences through these three productions; and we developed a fourth for presentation in 2024.

We delivered our ninth Kōanga Festival involving 146 artists, and reaching 1,957 audience members through a series of free or low ticketed events.

Statement of Accounting Policies

Te Pou Theatre Trust For the year ended 31 December 2024

'How did we do our accounting?'

Basis of Preparation

The entity is permitted by law to apply the Tier 3 (NFP) Standard issued by the External Reporting Board (XRB) and has elected to do so. A PBE may apply the standard if it does not have public accountability and has total annual expenses less than or equal to \$5,000,000. All transactions in the Performance Report are reported using the accrual basis of accounting. The Performance Report is prepared under the assumption that the entity will continue to operate in the foreseeable future.

Changes in Accounting Policies

There have been no changes in accounting policies. Policies have been applied on a consistent basis with those of the previous reporting period.

Goods and Services Tax (GST)

The entity is registered for GST. All amounts are stated exclusive of goods and services tax (GST) except for accounts payable and accounts receivable which are stated inclusive of GST.

Income Tax

Te Pou Theatre Trust is wholly exempt from New Zealand income tax having fully complied with all statutory conditions for these exemptions.

Bank Accounts and Cash

Bank accounts and cash in the Statement of Cash Flows comprise cash balances and bank balances (including short term deposits) with original maturities of 90 days or less.

Revenue Recognition

Revenue is recognised when the amount of revenue can be measured reliably and to the extent it is probable that the economic benefits will flow to the Trust and measured at the fair value of consideration received or receivable.

Revenue from Non-Exchange Transactions

Non-exchange transactions are those where the Trust receives an inflow of resources (i.e. cash and other tangible or intangible items) but provides no (or nominal) direct consideration in return.

Donations and Grants

The recognition of non-exchange revenue from donations and grants depends on the nature of any stipulations or conditions attached to the inflow of resources received (grants or donations) and whether this creates a liability (i.e. present obligation) rather than the recognition of revenue.

Grants or donations received where no performance conditions have been specified are recognised as revenue on receipt.

Grants or donations requiring specified future conditions to be met, or for the funds to be utilised in a specified way are recognised as a liability on receipt. The grants or donations are recognised as income over the period that the specified conditions are completed and the associated or specified costs are recognised.

Other Income

Interest is recognised as interest accrues, gross of refundable tax credits received.

Receivables

Receivables are stated at their estimated realisable value. Bad debts are written off in the year in which they are identified.

Property, Plant & Equipment

Property, plant and equipment are stated at historical cost less any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. Historical cost includes expenditure directly attributable to the acquisition of assets, and includes the cost of replacements that are eligible for capitalisation when these are incurred.

All other repairs and maintenance expenditure is recognised in the statement of financial performance as incurred.

Depreciation is calculated on a diminishing value basis over the estimated useful life of the assets using depreciation rates based on estimates by management.

An item of property, plant and equipment is derecognised upon disposal or when no further future economic benefits are expected from its use or disposal. Any gain or loss arising on derecognition of the asset (calculated as the difference between the net disposal proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset) is included in the statement of financial performance in the year the asset is derecognised.

Business Combinations

Acquisitions of businesses are accounted for using the acquisition method. The consideration transferred in a business combination is measured at fair value, which is calculated as the sum of the acquisition-date fair values of assets transferred to the Trust, liabilities incurred by the Trust to the former owners of the acquiree.

At the acquisition date, the identifiable assets acquired and the liabilities assumed are recognised at their fair value at the acquisition date.

Goodwill is measured as the excess of the sum of the consideration transferred over the net of the acquisition-date amounts of the identifiable assets acquired and the liabilities assumed.

Goodwill

Goodwill is an intangible asset representing the future economic benefits arising from assets acquired in a business combination that are not individually identified and separately recognised.

Goodwill is measured at cost less any accumulated impairment losses. Cost is the excess of consideration paid over the acquirer's interest in the net fair value of identifiable assets of the acquired business at the date of acquisition. Goodwill is assessed for impairment at least annually.
